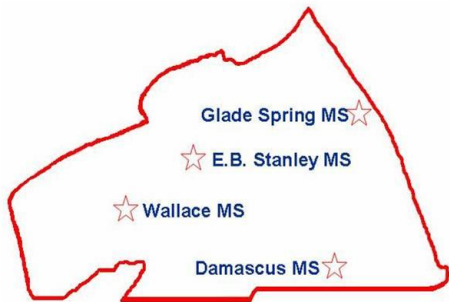

## WHO?

**JWCCS** are middle school students who demonstrate a high level of citizenship and community service, who maintain a “B” average and who have at least a 95% attendance record. These skills and attributes are highly desired as middle school students progress to high school.

## WHAT?

**JWCCS** is a program sponsored by Washington County Public Schools whose goal is to produce highly qualified students who value the importance of citizenship and service to community.

## WHEN?

**JWCCS** are identified and recognized annually during their middle school careers. Sixth and seventh graders are recognized in the spring, while eighth graders are recognized in the spring and also during class night activities.

## WHY?

Students choose to be **JWCCS** because their middle school education will enable them to be the best student possible during their high school years.

## HOW?

Interested students should see their guidance counselor to receive the requirements and expectations of a **JWCCS**.

## JWCCS Expectations

Service is a core component of the **JWCCS** program. Eight hours of documented community service are required. Following are examples of opportunities available to students for performing community service:

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A minimum of a “B” average is required for **JWCCS** recognition.

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School attendance must be 95% or above in order to be recognized as a **JWCCS**.

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A student with three disciplinary office referrals or any out-of-school suspension will not receive recognition for that school year.
